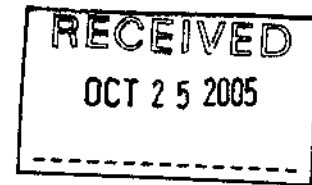

## **Part I: Introduction**

Citizens for Community Renewal ("CCR") is a Cornwall based community group with over 200 members. Since 2000, CCR, and its predecessor groups, have been committed to establishing an inquiry into the abuse allegations in the Cornwall area. Its membership consists of citizens of Cornwall who lived through the events which will form the subject-matter of the Commission's work.

It is CCR's central position that the failure of public institutions in Cornwall to respond appropriately to allegations of historical abuse of young people has had two profound effects on the community as a whole:

- (a) it has led to a significant loss of confidence in local institutions; and
- (b) it has left a cloud over Cornwall which has had a negative impact on all of its residents and will impede efforts to rebuild and revitalize the City.

CCR brings a unique perspective to this Commission, as it can speak directly and with authority on how the Cornwall community was affected by the institutional failures which will be the focus of the evidence in Part I of the Inquiry. This perspective cannot be duplicated by other anticipated parties such as the police, child welfare agencies, correctional services, the local Roman Catholic diocese or victims.

CCR's primary interest is in examining the manner in which information about allegations regarding historical abuse of minors and the investigation and prosecution of those allegations was disseminated to the community by various public institutions and other community sectors, including the local Catholic diocese. It believes that at critical times the community lacked the necessary information it was entitled to, and that on certain occasions information was

suppressed which citizens had a right to know. A central part of the Commission's mandate should be to determine how confidence in public institutions could have been maintained if information was properly disseminated to balance the rights of victims and alleged wrongdoers with the community's right to understand and appreciate the ramifications of serious allegations of wrongdoing. It is CCR's objective to assist the Commission in assessing the facts about these events from the community perspective and urge the Commission to consider how other small communities can respond to these kinds of allegations in the future.

## **Part II: Application for Party Status**

### **1. Overview of Citizens for Community Renewal**

#### **(a) History**

CCR is a community group comprised of members from the Cornwall area. In the summer of 2000, concerned citizens gathered together to support an MPP's private member bill calling for the establishment of an inquiry into the sexual abuse allegations in Cornwall. The citizens formed "Citizens for Bill 103", which organized a petition calling for community support for an inquiry and gathered approximately 12,000 signatures supporting its establishment. At the end of the petition drive, the group disbanded. Nevertheless, some of its former members were still interested in propelling the drive forward to establish the Inquiry, and they formed Citizens for Renewal, which was later renamed Citizens for Community Renewal. CCR was one of the key groups which advocated for the establishment of the Commission and was recognized as such by the Ontario legislature. The Attorney General for Ontario sought its input regarding the terms of reference for the Commission.

**(b) Corporate Status and Structure**

Since the establishment of the Commission, CCR has taken a number of steps to organize itself more formally. In April 2005, CCR became a registered not for profit corporation. Its Board of Directors was elected in mid-July 2005 for a two year term. The members of the board are as follows: Dan Carbonnell, Elaine MacDonald, Peggy Parker, Joanne Carbonnell, Marion Rose, Misty Carbonnell, Bill Parisien, Paul Scott, Deborah Jodoin, and Kenneth Parker. The officers are Paul Scott (President), Deborah Jodoin (Vice President), Ken Parker (Vice President), Misty Carbonnell (Secretary) and Dan Carbonnell (Treasurer). Their curriculum vitae are attached at Appendix 1.

On October 11, 2005, CCR's expanded Board of Directors had its first official meeting and elected the officers of the organization. In addition, on October 19, 2005, CCR had its first full meeting with its Board of Directors, officers, and members.

**(c) Objects**

In its corporate documents, the CCR lists the following objects as being the reason for its incorporation:

- (i) supporting and advancing renewal within the community at large;
- (ii) providing information, including that collected as a result of research, or otherwise, carried on under the auspices of the corporation, in relation to that support and advancement;

- (iii) advocating for, initiating, and undertaking processes and proceedings to examine or to investigate, judicially or otherwise, matters relating to such support and advancement;
- (iv) undertaking programs, alone or with others, to educate, to counsel, and to aid the disadvantaged;
- (v) co-ordinating activities of the corporation with those of similar organizations, societies and individuals; and
- (vi) such other complimentary purposes not inconsistent with these objects.

One of CCR's major objects is to participate in the work of the Commission. However, CCR anticipates having a life beyond that of the Commission and intends to be involved in a broad array of matters relating to community renewal.

**(d) Membership**

CCR has steadily increased its membership since its first incarnation in 2000. At present, it has in excess of 200 members. The membership list is attached at Appendix 2 and is provided to the Commission on a confidential basis.

**2. Status Sought by CCR**

CCR seeks full party standing for both Parts I and II of the Inquiry. In Part I, it seeks to have access to all documents provided to the Commission, to be represented by counsel, to make submissions on matters which come up during the course of the testimony which are relevant to its mandate, to cross-examine on testimony presented when appropriate and to present its own evidence (if that proves necessary). In Part II, it endeavours to put forward proposals on

processes, services or programs to prevent this type of problem from occurring again. It is important to note that CCR plans to be part of the renewal process that will take place after the Commission tables its report.

### 3. CCR Satisfies the Criteria for Standing for Parts I and II of the Inquiry

#### (a) The Terms of Reference

It is clear from the Terms of Reference that the Commission's mandate extends beyond the interests of the individuals who suffered specific harm to encompass the effects on the community of Cornwall and its citizens of the manner in which allegations of abuse of young people were investigated and prosecuted by local institutions. In particular, the Terms of Reference:

- note that "Community members have indicated that a public inquiry will encourage individual and community healing" (emphasis added);
- direct the Commission to examine the "institutional response of the justice system and other public institutions, including the interaction of their response with other public and community sectors" (emphasis added); and
- direct the Commission to inquire into "processes, services or programs that would encourage community healing and reconciliation in Cornwall" (emphasis added).

#### (b) Criteria for Standing

According to paragraph 8 of the Rules of Practice and Procedure, standing will be granted for Part I of the Inquiry if the Commissioner is satisfied that the applicant:

- (i) is directly and substantially affected by Part I of the Inquiry, or

- (ii) represents distinct ascertainable interests and perspectives that are essential to the Commissioner's mandate in Part I, which the Commissioner considers ought to be separately represented before the Inquiry.

(c) **The Legal Test for Standing**

The statutory test for standing is found in s. 5 of the *Public Inquiries Act* and reads:

5. (1) A commission shall accord to any person who satisfies it that the person has a substantial and direct interest in the subject-matter of its inquiry an opportunity during the Inquiry to give evidence and to call and examine or to cross-examine witnesses personally or by counsel on evidence relevant to the persons interest.

(i) *Precedents for the Granting of Standing to Citizens' Groups*

In the *Walkerton* inquiry, Commissioner O'Connor developed a general procedural approach to the grant of standing based on the values of thoroughness, expedition, openness to the public, and fairness. He granted standing to anyone who satisfied the "substantial and direct" interest test in s. 5(1) of the *Public Inquiries Act*, but also on a broader public interest basis. As a result, he granted standing to a number of groups who represented clearly ascertainable interests and perspectives that were essential to his mandate and who he thought should be separately represented before the Inquiry.<sup>1</sup>

Among the 21 groups to which Commissioner O'Connor granted standing were two citizens groups. Both "Concerned Walkerton Citizens" (CWC) and the "Walkerton Community Foundation" (WCF) were formed in response to the contamination. The CWC, who represented

a large number of residents, demonstrated a "serious, genuine and continuing concern" about the issues raised in Part I of the Inquiry, and was granted standing.<sup>2</sup> The WCF, which was comprised of a coalition of service clubs and other traditional community groups, was also granted standing as it presented a different perspective than the CWC on the events that had occurred and in particular on the possible causes of the contamination".<sup>3</sup> Commissioner O'Connor, in granting the WCF full standing, noted that the members of the WCF "had contributed an enormous amount of time and service to the Walkerton Community both before and after the tragedy".<sup>4</sup> Moreover, the citizens' groups were granted standing separately from the people who suffered injuries mainly because they had established their community concern over time and presented a broader local perspective.

In the *Arar* inquiry, standing was divided between parties and interveners. Those with a substantial and direct interest in all or part of the subject matter of the factual inquiry were considered parties. In contrast, those without a substantial and direct interest, but demonstrating concern in the issues raised in the mandate and a perspective and/or expertise considered helpful to the Commission were considered interveners. As a result, the Muslim Community Council of Ottawa-Gatineau, a community organization representing Muslim groups in the Ottawa area and across Canada was granted intervener standing only. They were permitted to make submissions on issues involving race relations, cross-cultural sensitivities, and the interaction of police and

other offices with racial and cultural minorities. This is consistent with the early recognition that much of the hearing would have to be held *in camera* for national security reasons.

Similarly, in the *Ipperwash* inquiry, the Centre Ipperwash Community Association ("CICA") was granted standing. The basis for the grant of standing to the CICA was that it had a distinct and ascertainable interest since it represented 120 non-First Nations households near Ipperwash. The Commission also found that its members had a direct and substantial interest in policy recommendations made by the Inquiry and that the CICA could provide a perspective which would assist the Commission in its mandate. However, CICA was only granted standing for Part II of the Inquiry.

There are obvious parallels between *Walkerton* and this Commission. All residents of Walkerton were seriously affected by the contamination and could be said to have a significant interest in the subject matter of Part I of that Inquiry. Similarly, all citizens of Cornwall can be said to have been affected by the collective failure of local institutions in the manner described earlier in this application. For that reason, it is submitted that Commissioner O'Connor's decision to grant full standing to two community groups has substantial persuasive value towards the adoption of a similar approach here. On the other hand, the subject-matter of *Arar* and *Ipperwash* is substantially different. In neither case were local community interests paramount to the subject-matter of the Inquiry, and, as a result, CCR submits that these decisions on standing are of only limited utility to the question of granting standing to CCR for this Commission. While Walkerton suffered a local health emergency Cornwall has suffered a social and legal emergency.

**(d) CCR Satisfies the Criteria for Standing for Part I of the Inquiry**

As set out above, CCR brings a unique perspective to this Commission, as it can speak directly and with authority on how the community was affected by the institutional failures which will be the subject-matter of the Commission's work. This gives it a distinct ascertainable interest and perspective that is essential to the Commissioner's mandate in Part I of the Inquiry.

CCR is more than a group of interested bystanders or busybodies. It is a group which has followed the issues surrounding the abuse allegations in Cornwall from the outset and perceived their impact on the larger community firsthand. CCR can also outline its experience with the progressive loss of community confidence in Cornwall's most fundamental community institutions: the police, the courts, governmental agencies, and the church. In particular, CCR can illustrate how lack of information and misinformation about significant events has contributed to the diminution of public confidence in fundamental institutions. Only those who observed those events as they happened, in succession and over time, can provide this important perspective.

As set out above, CCR's interest is in examining the manner in which information about allegations regarding historical abuse of minors and the investigation and prosecution of those allegations was disseminated to the community over time, and the extent to which that contributed to a loss of confidence in the public institutions and other community sectors involved. It is CCR's goal to be in a position to provide the Commission with recommendations to ensure that other small communities faced with similar issues are able to handle them differently in future. The following is a list of topics which CCR believes are relevant to its mandate and essential for the Commission to examine:

1. Did the Cornwall Police Force conduct an appropriate investigation into allegations of historical abuse of minors in Cornwall?

2. Did the Ontario Provincial Police conduct an appropriate investigation into allegations of historical abuse of minors in Cornwall? Why is it that the OPP initially issued a press release advising the community that the allegations were baseless and then subsequently established Project Truth? Did the OPP provide adequate disclosure to the community at all appropriate times?
3. Did local institutions cooperate with the Diocese in suppressing or covering-up allegations involving local clergy?
4. What training and guidance was provided to the relevant police agencies with respect to dissemination of information about ongoing investigations to the community?
5. What steps were or should have been taken by other public institutions and community organizations in Cornwall to advise the community of what they knew?
6. What steps were put in place by local institutions to ensure that victims were able to come forward with their allegations without fear of repercussion?
7. Do local institutions bear any responsibility for a rumour and innuendo campaign which has had the effect of tarnishing the reputation of specific members of the community?
8. Are community institutions using confidentiality agreements as a means to avoid criminal prosecutions? Are they also using confidentiality agreements to interfere with a victim's ability to seek reparation from perpetrators?
9. Should the Crown be obliged to provide an explanation to the community affected if it decides not to continue with a case?

10. Is the police complaint procedure effective at handling complaints by the public in a transparent and expedient manner?
11. How can the community ensure that community institutions will report and effectively handle allegations of abuse by children in the future? What are the methods by which community institutions can improve their treatment of abuse of children or allegations of abuse of children in the future?

Overall, the events in question, which are similar to the public health emergency faced by the Walkerton community, produced a social and legal emergency for Cornwall. As a result, it is necessary to consider how the institutions of small communities with limited resources need to be assisted when confronted by such emergencies.

It is important that the Commissioner appreciate that, unlike the other groups likely to receive standing at the Inquiry, CCR is not biased towards any particular outcome. Clearly many of the groups which will seek standing are involved in other ongoing legal proceedings. The local institutions involved, including the Diocese, will be concerned that they protect their position in any existing litigation, and that their testimony not give rise to further claims. A large group of victims has already commenced civil proceedings, and one of the primary interests of victims at this Inquiry will undoubtedly be to obtain evidence to support those lawsuits. Alleged perpetrators are likely to be concerned with maintaining their innocence and preserving their right to privacy.

It is CCR's view that these events have given rise to many victims. Young people who were the subject of abuse and whose allegations were not appropriately investigated are clearly victims. Members of the Cornwall community whose reputations were unfairly tarnished as a result of the

way in which allegations were investigated may be also considered victims, in a different sense. Furthermore, the events to be examined by this Commission have generated a "homophobic virus" which has resulted in discrimination against some gay individuals. Finally, the community as a whole is in a very real sense a victim of the general loss of confidence and malaise to which these events have given rise. Without the presence of CCR, there will likely not be any group before the Commission in Part I that is exclusively interested in advocating for the best interests of the Cornwall community.

As a result of these distinct ascertainable interests and perspectives that CCR represents, it is submitted that CCR fulfils the criteria for standing for Part I of the Inquiry.

**(e) Criteria for Standing for Part II of the Inquiry**

Paragraph 55 of the Rules of Practice and Procedure dictate that standing may be granted for Part II of the Inquiry if the Commissioner is satisfied that the applicant:

- (a) is sufficiently affected by Part II of the Inquiry; or
- (b) represents distinct ascertainable interests and perspectives that are essential to the Commissioner's mandate in Part II, and which the Commissioner considers ought to be separately represented before the Inquiry.

Part II of the Inquiry focuses on processes, services or programs that will encourage community healing and reconciliation in Cornwall.

**(f) CCR Satisfies the Criteria for Part II Standing**

*(i) CCR represents distinct ascertainable interests and perspectives*

As residents of Cornwall and long-time members of the Cornwall community, any process, service, or program recommended by the Inquiry will be utilized by the members of CCR. In addition, it is part of CCR's objects of incorporation to support and advance renewal within the community at large.

As a result, CCR maintains distinct ascertainable interests and perspectives in Part II of the Inquiry. CCR is in an ideal position to assist the Commissioner in developing and commenting upon processes, services or programs that will encourage community healing and reconciliation in Cornwall. Moreover, it can speak to the problems with information conveyance that occurred during the relevant time and the loss of faith in fundamental community institutions Cornwall residents experienced in the wake of the allegations. From this perspective, it can comment on the processes needed for healing in Cornwall. Moreover, CCR's counsel, who have links to the academic community, are investigating potential experts who can assist the Commission with regard to the issues of policing and the difficulties of responding to the abuse of young people by adults. Finally, as a community organization whose members will be primary users of all processes, services or programs recommended in this part of the Inquiry, CCR can provide its comments on the likelihood of success and the community's likelihood of acceptance of the proposed ideas.

**(g) Attempts to Contact Other Groups**

To the best of CCR's knowledge, there are two other community groups in Cornwall which have demonstrated an interest in the work of the Commission. Those two groups are Coalition for Action Cornwall, thought to be headed by Alain Seguin, and the Red Flag Committee, thought to be headed by Carson Chisholm. Paul Scott, the President of CCR, spoke to both Seguin and Chisholm within the last year to determine whether those groups could work in conjunction with CCR, and was advised by them that they would not. We note that the Red Flag Committee has publicly accused the Commissioner of a conflict of interest; it is unclear whether either group will seek standing at the Inquiry.

CCR understands that a victims' group organized by the Ledroit law firm (either under the Coalition name or in some other form) will apply for standing. Although CCR has some members who are victims of abuse, it is not a victims' group, and it does not have that focus. For the reasons outlined earlier we believe that CCR has a unique perspective that would be jeopardized if it was forced to work as part of a coalition with a victims' group.

In preparation for this Inquiry, CCR contacted a number of other community groups in the Cornwall area to ask if they wished to join CCR in its bid to gain standing. Attached as Appendix 3 are copies of the letters sent to these groups. One request was declined and no response was received from the other groups.

### **Part III: Application for Funding**

#### **4. Criteria for Funding**

The Rules of Practice and Procedure provide that the Commission may make recommendations to the Attorney General regarding funding to parties who have been granted standing, to the extent of the party's interest, where in the Commission's view the party would not be otherwise able to participate in the Inquiry without funding.

The Notice of Hearing provides that applications for funding should provide:

- (a) a statement of how the applicant satisfies the criteria for funding set out in the Rules of Practice and Procedure, and in demonstrating why an applicant would not otherwise be able to participate without such funding, the application may include financial information and, for organizations, financial statements, operating budgets, the number of members and membership fee structure.
- (b) A description of the purposes for which the funds are required, how the funds will be disbursed and how they will be accounted for;
- (c) A statement of the extent to which the applicant will contribute its own funds and personnel to participate in the Inquiry; and
- (d) The name, address, telephone number and position of the individual who will be responsible for administering the funds, and a description of the financial controls put in place to ensure that the funds are disbursed for the purpose of the Inquiry.

The Notice also provides that applicants should also indicate whether they have contacted other groups or individuals to bring them into an amalgamated group, and the results of those contacts.

**(a) CCR Precluded from Participating in Inquiry Without Funding**

CCR is a volunteer not-for-profit corporation. It does not have any financial resources of its own, and cannot participate effectively in the Inquiry without funding. CCR does not have a membership fee for its members.

**(b) Purposes for Funds and Disbursement of Funds**

**(i) Legal Fees and Disbursements**

CCR will be represented by Wardle Daley LLP and Professor Allan Manson.

Due to the length of and complexities expected from the Inquiry, there will be three counsel working on this file. These include Peter Wardle, Professor Manson, and an associate lawyer from Wardle Daley. However, counsel fees for only one counsel are being requested, and it is unlikely that more than one lawyer would be present during the hearing on a day to day basis.

Peter Wardle is an experienced civil litigation practitioner with almost 20 years experience. Allan Manson is a criminal law professor at Queen's University and a former criminal law practitioner. Curriculum vitae for both Peter Wardle and Allan Manson are at Appendix 4.

**(ii) CCR's Disbursements**

CCR will require reimbursement for disbursements for routine administrative needs, such as photocopying, meeting costs, printing etc, and also for the travel costs of occasional trips to Toronto or Kingston to meet with counsel. It is not expected that these disbursements will be significant.

**(c) CCR's Contribution of Funds and Personnel**

CCR is not in a position to contribute substantial funds for the purposes of this Inquiry. However, it has contributed \$1,150 by way of disbursements already in order to establish a corporate structure and to prepare for the standing application and seeks reimbursement for the expensed funds.

However, CCR is quite wealthy in terms of personnel. All of its Board of Directors and many of its members are willing to participate in the Inquiry in any needed manner.

**(d) Administrator of Funds and Description of Financial Controls**

**(i) Financial Controls**

All intervener funding monies will be placed in the client trust account at Wardle Daley LLP, which is equipped with all necessary financial controls and accountability mechanisms for client trust accounts pursuant to the rules of the Law Society of Upper Canada. Wardle Daley LLP is responsible for the trust account and Julie Emilio administers the account. Her contact information is listed below. Wardle Daley LLP will provide periodic accounts to CCR which will be approved by the Treasurer of CCR and one of the President or the Vice President of CCR prior to requests for reimbursement from the Province. If the Treasurer is incapacitated in any

way, accounts must be approved by any two of the President and Vice Presidents of CCR prior to reimbursement from the Province. Instructions to pay disbursements will be directed from a CCR steering committee.




**Conclusion**
