Reverend Father Dale Crampton

On the 27th of July, Father Dale Crampton, Lawyer at the Ottawa Regional Tribunal, and Administrator of Our Lady of Divine Love Parish, Pendleton, Ontario, will leave for Africa. He will teach theology and canon law at the International Seminary for Malawi and Zambia. Candidates for the priesthood of the 14 dioceses of these two countries study at this Seminary.

Father Crampton is a native of Ottawa. After studying at St. Patrick's High School and College, he began his studies for the priesthood at St. Augustine's Seminary, Toronto; the University Seminary, Ottawa; and completed Theology at the Ottawa Major Seminary. He was ordained a priest on June 11, 1963, for the Archdiocese of Ottawa.

Father Crampton served in St. Margaret Mary's and St. Elizabeth's parish as an assistant priest and was appointed to Pendleton in 1967. He began post graduate studies in Canon Law that same year and graduated with Master's degree in Law from Ottawa University and a J.C.L. from St. Paul's University in 1969. For the past four years he has been associated with the Regional Tribunal.
