Armed Forces officials in Edmonton have thrown
a wall of secrecy around the case of a Roman Catholic chaplain involved in the second scandal at the mili-

tary base in two months.

Chaplain Capt. Angus A. McRae has been sentenced to four years to bugger, involving a child after being convicted two weeks ago in a closed court mar-

The Canadian Forces Base Edmonton-Namao case has scandalized the local Roman Catholic community.

McRae was convicted of violating sections 155, 156 and 157 of the Criminal Code of Canada, which cover buggery, indecent assault on a male and gross indecency, Capt. Jim Grey said yesterday in Edmonton.

Grey refused further comment, including McRae's age, family background or where he will serve the sentence, saving he was inder orders from superiors.

age, family background or where he will serve the sentence, saying he was under orders from superiors.

In June, Cpl. Larry King, 39, was sentenced in civilian court to three years in prison for choking and raping a 16-year-old Edmonton girl.

McRae is confined to the base jail for now. When or if he'll be moved is a secret.

Grey said the National Defeace Act authorizes the military to try personnel for crimes, excluding rape, murder and manslaughter.

The act also permits in-camera trials "in the interest of public safety, defence or public morals," Grey added.

Under the military gag laws, none of the evidence is open to public scrutiny.

McRae is also automatically turied out of the services "with disgrace" under the act because his sentence is longer than two years.

The severity of the sentence also means a review by Defence Minister Gilles Lamontagne.

No one was infimediately available in Lamontagne's Ottawa office for comment.

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Roman Catholic Chaplain-General F.H. Boucher said he was familiar with the case, but that any information concerning. Modern's background would have to come

from the press office.

Father Hamilton, assistant to Edmonton Archbishop Joseph MacNell, said McRae's sentence likely will be appealed. He also said there are no plans to excommunitate McRae.

Asked whether McRae would be allowed to con-tinue as a priest despite the conviction, Hamilton said "it's possible."
