Adult Education
Classes Offered

Lethbridge Junior College will provide adult education classes never before offered in Southern Alberta.

In co-operation with the extension department of the University of Alberta, the College will offer extension evening classes.

Although no credits will be given, the courses will enable

adults to attend lectures in various fields of interest, extension department officials said.

FOR 10 WEEKS

Each course will consist of two hours of lectures and practical work once a week. They will run for a period of 10 weeks and registration fee will be \$10.

While plans for all courses have not yet been completed, officials said the first has been set to start the week of Oct. 14.

It will be a 10-week course in choral work with both lectures on the fundamentals of voice production and the background to choral music, as well as practical singing sessions.

Instructor will be Miss Bridget Headley, a graduate of Oxford University who is presently on the extension staff of the University of Alberta. She will make her headquarters in Lethbridge and will also teach a class in Taber.

Other proposed courses include oral French, law for the layman, psychology and world affairs.

Only requisite for anyone planning to take such a course is that he be interested in learning, the officials said, but in some cases, the number of students allowed per class will be limited to make for better teaching conditions.

Applications may be sent or taken to the registrar of extension evening classes at the Lethbridge Junior College.

Basilian Fathers Assume Teaching Roles in
Lethbridge Separat School System

An important step forward in Catholic education in southern Alberta has been taken by Lethbridge separate school officials.

For the first time in the history of the instructional staff, they will teach at the St. Francis Boys' High School, classes of which are accommodated in temporary quarters pending the completion of the new building.

The three are Basilian fathers, members of one of the oldest established orders of teaching priests in Canada. There are branches throughout Canada, United States and Mexico.

HEADS SCHOOL

Principal of St. Francis school is Rev. E. J. McMahon who comes here from St. Mary's Boys School in Calgary. Also appointed to the Lethbridge staff are Rev. Gerald Gregoire and Rev. Fred Cahill.

Father McMahon was educated in his native Ottawa where he received a bachelor of arts and licentiate in philosophy at the University of Ottawa. He later did graduate work in science and mathematics at the University of Notre Dame in Indiana and the University of Michigan. He taught in Calgary for 15 years and was vice-principal of the school at the time of his appointment to Lethbridge.

Second member is Father Gregoire, an ardent sportsman who in his earlier days was a member of a championship St. Michael's College junior hockey team at Toronto.

He received a bachelor of arts degree from the University of Toronto and took graduate work at Laval University in Quebec City. After coming to Alberta, he studied education at the University of Alberta.

RCAF VETERAN

An outstanding military career came before teaching for Father Cahill, third of Lethbridge's Basilian teachers. He served in the RCAF during the Second World War attaining the rank of squadron leader in overseas service. Presently he is a lieutenant commander in the Royal Canadian Naval Reserve.

Father Cahill, also a graduate of St. Michael's College, received a bachelor of arts degree at the University of Toronto and a master's degree at the University of
