3	THE REGISTRAR: This hearing of the Cornwall
4	Public Inquiry is now in session. The Honourable Mr.
5	Justice Normand Glaude presiding.
6	Please be seated. Veuillez vous asseoir.
7	THE COMMISSIONER: Thank you. Good morning
8	all. Mr. Engelmann.
9	MR. ENGELMANN: Good morning, Mr.
10	Commissioner. We will be recommencing with the OPP
11	presentation, the narrative dealing with the evidence of
12	David Silmser. Mr. Kozloff is here and ready to go.
13	At some point during the day, we may have a
14	witness to have some in camera evidence, and it won't be
15	long, but I have advised counsel that I anticipate that may
16	happen during the course of the day as well.
17	THE COMMISSIONER: Great, thank you.
18	MR. ENGELMANN: Thank you.
19	THE COMMISSIONER: Mr. Kozloff.
20	SUBMISSIONS BY/REPRÉSENTATIONS PAR MR.KOZLOFF:
21	MR. KOZLOFF: Good morning, sir.
22	THE COMMISSIONER: Good morning, sir.
23	MR. KOZLOFF: Mr. Commissioner, I think we
24	should begin by recognizing that that is Professor Manson,
25	albeit slightly lighter in weight than he was the last time

1	he	was	here.

THE COMMISSIONER: I think it's just people

3 that are envious, Mr. Manson.

4 MR. MANSON: I think you are absolutely

5 right. My youth.

6 THE COMMISSIONER: Yes.

MR. KOZLOFF: Mr. Commissioner, the second area that I was going to touch on is with respect to the allegations against the schoolteacher Marcel Lalonde and the transcript date is January the 30th. There is a reference at page 71 to Exhibit 267, which is the transcript of the videotaped interview of David Silmser at the OPP detachment in Kanata where he was interviewed by Detective Inspector Smith and Detective Constable Fagan on the 22nd of February 1994. Mr. Silmser's evidence is that, that was the first reference by him to Marcel Lalonde and his abuse at the hands of Marcel Lalonde to a police officer.

You will recall in his evidence, and it is referenced at pages 99 to page 102 on the 30th of January, that he was interviewed on November 2nd, 1993 -- so that would be approximately three months earlier -- by the Children's Aid Society. And that was, according to his evidence, the first time he had ever mentioned to any person in authority that he had been a victim of Marcel

1	Lalonde.
2	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
3	MR. KOZLOFF: And then he was being
4	questioned about the handwritten interview report prepared
5	by Detective Constable Millar and Detective Constable
6	McDonell of the OPP on the 26^{th} of November 1993. You will
7	recall that that interview took place immediately following
8	the death of Ken Seguin.
9	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
10	MR. KOZLOFF: Those officers were
11	investigating that death. They questioned Mr. Silmser in
12	his home on the following day, the $26^{\rm th}$ of November, and he
13	was asked about whether he had mentioned his abuse by
14	Marcel Lalonde to the officers and his answer was:
15	"I didn't think that they were
16	interested in that."
17	I would have suggested to Mr. Silmser that
18	Detective Constable Millar and Detective Constable McDonell
19	couldn't possibly have been interested in something that
20	they knew nothing about and, indeed, the evidence is clear
21	that the only person to whom Mr. Silmser had referenced Mr.
22	Lalonde was the CAS investigator on the 2^{nd} of November
23	1993, and there is no evidence and I am satisfied, I would
24	submit to you, that there was never any communication

between the CAS and any police force in connection with

1	Lalonde between the 2 nd of November and the 26 th of November
2	THE COMMISSIONER: Okay. I just want to
3	make sure that
4	MR. KOZLOFF: Yes.
5	THE COMMISSIONER: we stay within the
6	realm of facts and not submissions.
7	MR. KOZLOFF: Right. Right.
8	THE COMMISSIONER: So what I'm taking from
9	what you are saying is that your review of the
10	documentation does not disclose any written communications
11	between the CAS and McDonell.
12	MR. KOZLOFF: Right; or actually it was
13	Detective Constable Millar who was conducting the
14	interview.
15	THE COMMISSIONER: Okay, so we'll let's
16	be careful about submissions.
17	MR. KOZLOFF: Yes. No, no and that's why I
18	couched it in that way, sir.
19	THE COMMISSIONER: All right.
20	MR. KOZLOFF: The second thing I would
21	suggest to Mr. Silmser was that once the Ontario Provincial
22	Police was made aware of the fact that Mr. Silmser was
23	alleging abuse by Lalonde as a result of the interview
24	conducted by Greg Bell on the 2nd of November at the CAS, I
25	would suggest to him that the OPP was made aware of that

1	fact on the 8^{th} of February 1994, and that was as a result
2	of an interview of Greg Bell by OPP Constable Don Genier.
3	Don Genier, at that point, was assigned to assist Detective
4	Inspector Hamelink, H-A-M-E-L-I-N-K. Detective Inspector
5	Hamelink was assigned to investigate the alleged extortion
6	of Ken Seguin by David Silmser and that investigation was
7	conducted in the year 1994.
8	That information was transmitted by
9	Detective Constable Genier to Detective Inspector Smith.
10	THE COMMISSIONER: What information now?
11	MR. KOZLOFF: The information that there had
12	been an allegation against a Marcel Lalonde.
13	THE COMMISSIONER: Okay. And this is
14	documented somewhere?
15	MR. KOZLOFF: Yes, it is.
16	THE COMMISSIONER: And you will be showing
17	me that?
18	MR. KOZLOFF: I will.
19	THE COMMISSIONER: Okay.
20	MR. KOZLOFF: And then you will note in
21	Exhibit 267 at page 37, perhaps that could be brought up.
22	(SHORT PAUSE / COURTE PAUSE)
23	MR. KOZLOFF: Exhibit 267. Do you need a
24	document number?
25	MR. ENGELMANN: It's 7150518.

1	THE COMMISSIONER: All right. So that's the
2	interview that was held on February the $22^{ ext{nd}}$ 1994. This is
3	a transcription of that interview.
4	MR. KOZLOFF: Yes.
5	THE COMMISSIONER: Okay.
6	MR. KOZLOFF: If you go to page 37 of that -
7	
8	THE COMMISSIONER: Thank you.
9	MR. KOZLOFF: document, Madam Registrar.
10	You will see how it's raised by Detective Inspector Smith:
11	"There was some other indication about
12	a school teacher."
13	Answer:
14	"Yeah."
15	Smith:
16	"Can you tell me anything about this
17	school teacher?"
18	Silmser:
19	"Well, I remember going over to his
20	place and he tried to take advantage of
21	me too and grab me."
22	"Is his name Marcel Lalonde?"
23	"Marcel Lalonde."
24	"And where does he teach school?"
25	"Bishop McDonell, Grade 8."

1	"Was he your teacher?"
2	"Yeah."
3	"And can you tell us what happened with
4	him?"
5	And Mr. Silmser then goes into a brief
6	description of what occurred.
7	I would have suggested to Mr. Silmser that
8	if Detective Inspector Smith had not asked Mr. Silmser
9	directly about Lalonde in that interview, that Mr. Silmser
10	would never have raised this allegation with the police.
11	There were in fact, sir, and you've heard
12	about some of them, numerous efforts made by the Children's
13	Aid Society, the Cornwall Police Service, and the Ontario
14	Provincial Police to pursue Mr. Silmser's allegations
15	against Lalonde, but the simple fact is, that for whatever
16	reason, Mr. Silmser was not interested in a police
17	investigation of Marcel Lalonde. Even in later 1996, when
18	another victim came forward, and you've heard this evidence
19	from Mr. Silmser himself, he was not prepared to assist in
20	the investigation or the prosecution.
21	THE COMMISSIONER: You're going to show me
22	to that?
23	MR. KOZLOFF: Well, Mr. Silmser told you
24	about that himself. You'll recall that he asked Detective
25	Constable Fagan to intercede on his behalf with the

Silmser with independent, legal advice.

1	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
2	MR. KOZLOFF: And you asked the following
3	question of Mr. Silmser:
4	"On Sean Adams, did you ever pay and
5	get a bill for the services that he
6	gave you."
7	Answer:
8	"I paid but I never got a bill."
9	Question:
10	"Oh, no, no, okay, so he charged you
11	some money. You paid your account and
12	that was it?"
13	Answer:
14	"Yes, I did."
15	Mr. Engelmann then asks:
16	"Just to follow-up. So you didn't
17	actually get an invoice?
18	Answer:
19	"No".
20	Question:
21	"You just paid him an amount of money?"
22	Answer:
23	"I think it was on the street. I think
24	I handed him \$400 or in his car or
25	something cash."

1	If the interence by Mr. Silmser is that he
2	received nothing to evidence the payment of the account
3	from Mr. Adams, I would refer you to Exhibit 271 this is
4	the November 26^{th} , 1993 handwritten interview at page 3,
5	about 10 lines from the bottom. Right after the words
6	"Malcolm MacDonald Trust Account." Do you see that, sir?
7	"I paid Shawn Adams about four days
8	later and received receipt 07255 dated
9	September 7, 1993."
10	Then at page 121 I'm going on to another
11	point now.
12	THE COMMISSIONER: Yes.
13	MR. KOZLOFF: At page 121 on the 30^{th} of
14	January
15	THE COMMISSIONER: One-twenty-one (121),
16	Madam Clerk?
17	MR. KOZLOFF: Mr. Silmser is suggesting that
18	he said more to the officers during the course of the
19	interview then is recorded on his statement. He says:
20	"Yes, there was more and I don't know
21	why that's not on because I am sure I
22	told them."
23	And what he is referring to is the final
24	telephone conversation with Ken Seguin on the Wednesday
25	night before the eve of his death, telling Ken Seguin in

1	their final telephone conversation that he had gone to the
2	Cornwall Police and that he had told them the truth, and
3	that was the last thing that was said during the
4	conversation and then his evidence was that Mr. Seguin hung
5	up.
6	The first response that I would have to
7	that, sir, would be his own evidence six pages earlier at
8	page 115 of the January 30^{th} transcript. You asked him:
9	"And you don't take any issue with this
10	being what you would have told the OPP
11	that day?"
12	THE COMMISSIONER: Hang on now. Where is
13	that?
14	MR. KOZLOFF: Sorry. Page 115.
15	THE COMMISSIONER: Okay. Right.
16	THE REGISTRAR: Line 17.
17	THE COMMISSIONER: I'm sorry?
18	THE REGISTRAR: Line 17.
19	THE COMMISSIONER: Yes. Thank you.
20	MR. KOZLOFF: Do you have it, Mr.
21	Commissioner?
22	THE COMMISSIONER: Yes. Thank you.
23	MR. KOZLOFF: "And you don't take any
24	issue with this being what you would
25	have told the OPP that day?"

1	Answer:
2	"No."
3	Question:
4	"All right. Just on that note, do you
5	know if they would have given you an
6	opportunity to read the statement
7	before you signed it?"
8	Answer:
9	"I would believe so, yes."
10	So, this is what I would put to Mr. Silmser
11	and what I would suggest.
12	First of all, there was absolutely no reason
13	for the officers to leave this statement out; this alleged
14	statement by Mr. Silmser that he made to them that he and
15	Seguin had this conversation that culminated with Mr.
16	Seguin saying
17	THE COMMISSIONER: I'm sorry, sir, you're
18	going into what I would call argument.
19	MR. KOZLOFF: All right. Well, no, what I
20	would suggest to Mr. Silmser, sir, is this. These officers
21	are conducting an investigation into a death.
22	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
23	MR. KOZLOFF: It appears to be a suicide.
24	They have an assignment which is to find the evidence with
25	respect to an explanation for this death. This man says

1	that he told them "Well, the last thing I said to him was
2	that I've gone to the Cornwall Police and told them the
3	truth."
4	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
5	MR. KOZLOFF: That's not in the statement.
6	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
7	MR. KOZLOFF: My submission to Mr. Silmser
8	is there is no reason for the officers for the OPP
9	officers to leave that out.
10	THE COMMISSIONER: Well, okay, and I think
11	what we're doing is we're getting to the point where what I
12	would want is you to point out the two
13	MR. KOZLOFF: Right.
14	THE COMMISSIONER: but leave the
15	submissions for later. And I think that will come in your
16	institutional response.
17	MR. KOZLOFF: I understand what you're
18	saying, sir, but what I'm trying to do here is to conduct a
19	substitute for a cross-examination.
20	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
21	MR. KOZLOFF: It would be open to me, I
22	submit to you, sir, to suggest to the witness that there
23	was no reason for these officers not to include the very
24	evidence that they were seeking in conducting the
25	interview. That's the point I'm trying to make.

1	THE COMMISSIONER: I understand that, sir,
2	except that given the limitations that we have I think on
3	this form of cross-examination, what I thought we would do,
4	and what's happened so far, is that you show a comment that
5	he made in the transcript, and that's great, and then you
6	show that there is no document that the document is
7	different.
8	MR. KOZLOFF: Right.
9	THE COMMISSIONER: So right now what you
10	have is you've got in one corner Mr. Engelmann said "Look
11	it, this is the statement and you have no problems with
12	this statement" and yet later on he comes up and he shows -
13	- and he says something different.
14	MR. KOZLOFF: So what we have, first of all,
15	is we have a contradiction between what he says he says and
16	what is contained in the statement that he gave.
17	THE COMMISSIONER: That's right.
18	MR. KOZLOFF: Secondly, we have his
19	evidence, and in his response to your question, that he was
20	given an opportunity to read the statement over before
21	signing it and he says he did and signed it.
22	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
23	MR. KOZLOFF: And then I'm suggesting, sir,
24	that it's unlikely that the officers would leave something
25	out that was directly on the issue of what they were

1	conducting an investigation on.
2	THE COMMISSIONER: And what I'm saying
3	MR. KOZLOFF: And he could respond in any
4	way he wished.
5	THE COMMISSIONER: Right. And what I'm
6	saying though is that given the fact that he's not here
7	MR. KOZLOFF: Right.
8	THE COMMISSIONER: I would prefer that
9	you not give me that comment at this time.
10	MR. KOZLOFF: All right.
11	THE COMMISSIONER: But no, let me finish. I
12	think there is a time and a place where you will be able to
13	argue that. That will be in argument or in the
14	presentation of the institutional response.
15	MR. KOZLOFF: Okay.
16	THE COMMISSIONER: So all I want to do is be
17	very clear with you that I want to maintain that format for
18	now and I see Mr. Engelmann is getting up so that we
19	can keep it fair keep it on an even keel for everyone.
20	MR. KOZLOFF: All right.
21	MR. ENGELMANN: I just have a quick comment,
22	if I may.
23	THE COMMISSIONER: Sure.
24	MR. ENGELMANN: Mr. Kozloff and just for
25	clarification purposes, Mr. Kozloff has referred a couple

1	times to your questions of Mr. Silmser.
2	THE COMMISSIONER: Right.
3	MR. ENGELMANN: And they were my questions.
4	Just so it's clear for the record.
5	THE COMMISSIONER: Yeah. The last one was
6	his question.
7	MR. ENGELMANN: It's on the transcript.
8	MR. KOZLOFF: No.
9	THE COMMISSIONER: Yes.
10	MR. ENGELMANN: I just don't want that to be
11	confused.
12	THE COMMISSIONER: I know. As odd as that
13	might be.
14	MR. KOZLOFF: I thought it was a really good
15	question.
16	MR. ENGELMANN: My tie's a different colour.
17	THE COMMISSIONER: Well, that's why I
18	couldn't figure it out because when you said that I said
19	that, I said "My, my, just on that note" in any event,
20	Mr. Engelmann had turned that sentence quite around and I
21	thought it was very scholarly and I wouldn't want to take
22	credit for his scholarly questions.
23	MR. KOZLOFF: I apologize for that.
24	THE COMMISSIONER: Just a minute. You've
25	got some other

1	MR. WALLACE: Good morning.
2	THE COMMISSIONER: Yes.
3	MR. WALLACE: I've risen because I
4	anticipate to be in the exact same position as Mr. Kozloff.
5	I have drafted my presentation in a fashion
6	much the same to the extent, I will be making transcript
7	references, notebook references and the like. But at the
8	end of it is leading up to a suggestion that I would have
9	made to the witness. And I would greatly appreciate being
10	allowed to make that. You take itmake it for what it's
11	worth, but it really gives the overall point of what it was
12	I was trying to do, as I believe Mr. Kozloff doing the same
13	thing, with a witness who's not here.
14	But otherwise, in my respectful submission,
15	it's pretty flat. You go up to the edge but you don't
16	deliver the punch line. And I don't expect and I
17	recognize the fact that at the end of the day it will be a
18	matter for submission but we could have asked the question
19	of the witness, it would be a proper question, and, you
20	know, since we don't have an answer I don't expect you to
21	make any findings at this point in time, but for the
22	purposes of the presentation to allow it to be complete and
23	fair, bearing in mind that it's simply a suggestion that
24	would have been made and take it for what it is. But I
25	think we should be allowed to do that.

1	THE COMMISSIONER: I don't agree but I'll
2	listen to further submissions from people who want to
3	comment.
4	And I'll tell you why that I have some
5	problems with that, is that I fully expect this to be dry
6	in the sense that I know in the way Mr. Kozloff is
7	setting out his argument, he's saying "Look it, I want to
8	go here." I mean, once we get to the point where he points
9	out the inconsistencies, I think the job has been done and
10	then I'm the one who is going to be making determinations
11	and I don't want to leave on the record these questions out
12	there until the proper moment, and the proper moment for
13	you to make those comments will be either in the
14	institutional response through the officers or in argument
15	at the end. So I don't know that it serves I think its
16	prejudicial value outweighs the probative value for my
17	purposes in this adaptation of a cross-examination.
18	MR. WALLACE: Well, I'd ask you to consider
19	this. Given the fact that at this stage nobody is asking
20	you to accept that suggestion, it is simply a suggestion
21	that will be in some cases, I would expect, fleshed out in
22	the manner that you have spoken of but that's not going to
23	be for some time realistically, and if which would have
24	been the case whether Mr. Silmser was here or not.
25	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.

1	MR. WALLACE: And we could make these
2	suggestions to him and he could say "Forget it. I don't
3	accept it. That's stupid."
4	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
5	MR. WALLACE: On the other hand he might
6	have agreed with it. But that is really irrelevant. We
7	could have made the suggestion. We're not asking you at
8	this stage to make any finding, but rather we're trying to
9	do the best we can in less than perfect circumstances, and
10	I think that it adds flesh to the whole point of the
11	exercise, in my respectful submission. And given the fact
12	that we're not asking you, nor could we ask you to make any
13	findings based on these suggestions, at this stage at
14	least, there could be no prejudice, in my respectful
15	submission.
16	THE COMMISSIONER: Mr. Engelmann.
17	MR. ENGELMANN: I guess to some extent it
18	will depend on the nature of the question. If a question's
19	being posed or suggested that, you know, would you agree
20	that the officer would have thought this, or you know, I
21	don't know whether a witness could answer a question like
22	that so perhaps the question wouldn't be proper but in
23	certain circumstances it may, and I think this may be a
24	situation where you might consider it on a case-by-case

basis and we see where we go.

So what I'm trying to do is to leave it at, this is what I would have responded with these documents, with these statements, with this evidence under oath, this is the contradiction or this amplifies on the answer that he provided to you, to assist you.

1	THE COMMISSIONER: I have no problems with
2	that, and I've asked you a couple of times to leave
3	MR. KOZLOFF: Yes.
4	THE COMMISSIONER: maybe what I would
5	call editorial comment or that kind of thing for later. So
6	we'll proceed with your presentation and then we'll see
7	we'll deal with Mr. Wallace when the time comes.
8	MR. KOZLOFF: What I would have suggested on
9	this point to Mr. Silmser, aside from
10	THE COMMISSIONER: I am sorry, now what
11	point are we on now?
12	MR. KOZLOFF: This is still the issue of
13	whether he said to Millar and McDonell what he claims he
14	said under oath here.
15	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
16	MR. KOZLOFF: About telling Seguin in their
17	final conversation that he had gone to the Cornwall Police.
18	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
19	MR. KOZLOFF: And that he had told him the
20	truth and the response of Seguin was to silence and then
21	hang up.
22	The alternative, sir, is that Silmser told
23	him that. He told Millar and McDonell what he says he did
24	and they failed to record it and then he missed the
25	omission when reading it over before signing it. That's

1	one alternative.
2	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
3	MR. KOZLOFF: The second alternative is that
4	he told them that; they failed to record it. He noted the
5	omission when he read over his statement but he chose not
6	to say anything about it.
7	The third alternative is that he didn't tell
8	them what he claims to have told them whether because he
9	had forgotten about it. In other words, it did happen but
10	he forgot about it, or because he didn't want to, or
11	because it never happened.
12	And the only independent evidence that you
13	have to refer to in assessing which of the alternatives it
14	was
15	THE COMMISSIONER: They're not mutually
16	exclusive, there may be other alternatives.
17	MR. KOZLOFF: Correct. Those are the ones
18	that I could think of.
19	The independent evidence that you have to
20	look as is the comment in January of 2003 which is almost a
21	year earlier, to Heidi Sebalj about Ken Seguin running
22	scared.
23	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm. Well, no, that's
24	not fair. That's what we've heard so far. We may have one
25	of your officers come up and say "My God, you know what, he

1	was right. I forgot to put it in."
2	MR. KOZLOFF: They might.
3	THE COMMISSIONER: Or, you know, "I did it
4	on purpose not to put it in"
5	MR. KOZLOFF: I said that's
6	THE COMMISSIONER: that's speculation.
7	MR. KOZLOFF: I said that's the evidence
8	that you have so far.
9	THE COMMISSIONER: No, I think I thought you
10	said that was the only evidence I had.
11	MR. KOZLOFF: It's the only evidence that
12	you have so far. Certainly, there may be further evidence.
13	THE COMMISSIONER: You know, I don't know, I
14	am uncomfortable in the way this is going. I can tell you
15	that your inconsistencies and the way that you point it out
16	have made your point and I don't know to go any further
17	MR. KOZLOFF: I'll get on to my next point.
18	THE COMMISSIONER: Please do. Thank you.
19	MR. KOZLOFF: You heard evidence at pages
20	131 to 134 on January 30^{th} concerning a telephone call Mr.
21	Silmser made to an official at the Ministry of Corrections.
22	Mr. Engelmann attempted to assist Mr. Silmser by suggesting
23	that it was Bill Roy
24	THE COMMISSIONER: Hang on a second now.
25	I am sorry

1	MR. ENGELMANN: Just be a moment.
2	THE COMMISSIONER: Right. Just be a moment.
3	Guess we're talking about a transcript
4	MR. KOZLOFF: The transcript date is January
5	30 th .
6	THE COMMISSIONER: I think we have it here
7	but so, and you're saying that he Mr. Silmser
8	testified that he called
9	MR. KOZLOFF: Yes, you'll see Mr.
10	Engelmann's question:
11	"A couple of weeks after Mr. Seguin's
12	death, so we're in mid-December of
13	1993, do you recall if you placed a
14	call to an official from the Ministry
15	of Corrections?"
16	Mr. Silmser says:
17	"Yes".
18	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
19	MR. KOZLOFF: Mr. Engelmann goes on to
20	suggest that it was Bill Roy. And the evidence of Mr.
21	Silmser is that he called to report allegations of sexual
22	abuse by Ken Seguin because:
23	"I believed there was more than just me
24	being abused by him. I wanted him to
25	open up Ken Seguin's files and go

1	through where his clients were and make
2	sure that nobody else was abused by Ken
3	Seguin. He responded by saying he was
4	going to call the OPP on me".
5	And then he later goes on to say "I never
6	heard from them" referring to the OPP over that phone call,
7	"no". Mr. Engelmann suggested again this phone call took
8	place in mid-December of 1993.
9	In response sir, I would point to the notes
10	of OPP Constable Ron Wilson. That's at Document 737488.
11	(SHORT PAUSE/COURTE PAUSE)
12	THE COMMISSIONER: Thank you, Exhibit 391.
13	EXHIBIT NO./PIÈCE NO P-391:
14	(737488) Handwritten Notes of Detective
15	Constable Ron Wilson - July 26, 1993
16	MR. KOZLOFF: Now, Document 737488 is the
17	notes of OPP Detective Constable Ron Wilson and I'll warn
18	you right now they go in reverse order. In other words,
19	the pages the first page is in effect the last page of
20	the notes. I believe it ends around the $14^{\rm th}$ of December.
21	They begin sometime in October.
22	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
23	MR. KOZLOFF: And the way in which Detective
24	Constable just for your edification, sir, the way in
25	which Detective Constable Wilson becomes involved is that

26

'I want to let it drop; I am very upset

1	with the way the whole thing was
2	handled.' I asked for Silmser to put
3	this in writing and he replied 'I'm not
4	going to put nothing in writing for
5	nobody"
6	THE COMMISSIONER: Just a minute.
7	MR. KOZLOFF: Yes?
8	THE COMMISSIONER: Put this in writing and
9	then
10	MR. KOZLOFF: Yes, he replied
11	THE COMMISSIONER: Where?
12	MR. KOZLOFF: It's I'm actually reading
13	the notes I'm sorry. If you start at pages the
14	conversation begins at 7156524
15	THE COMMISSIONER: Oh I've got you, then it
16	goes to the end of the page
17	MR. KOZLOFF: Yes.
18	THE COMMISSIONER: And it says "to put this
19	in" and then I flip backwards as you've indicated and I
20	don't see it continue where does it continue from there,
21	I guess that's the question?
22	MR. KOZLOFF: Silmser replied "I want to let
23	it drop
24	THE COMMISSIONER: Yes.
25	MR. KOZLOFF: I'm very upset". Do you

1	have that?
2	THE COMMISSIONER: Yes.
3	MR. KOZLOFF: "I'm very upset with the way
4	the whole thing was handled. I asked
5	for Silmser to put this in
6	THE COMMISSIONER: Yes. Next page, where is
7	the next page?
8	MR. KOZLOFF: Is that 7156523?
9	(SHORT PAUSE/COURTE PAUSE)
10	THE COMMISSIONER: Yes, the next page goes
11	to December 14 and the next page is all blanked out there.
12	MR. KOZLOFF: See, I have the page. I
13	believe what happened is that I had noted that the
14	Commission version was blacked out. I have the page in
15	front of me; I'm reading from it. This is from the
16	original material provided by the OPP to the Commission.
17	THE COMMISSIONER: So why is the whole page
18	blacked out then?
19	MR. KOZLOFF: I don't know.
20	THE COMMISSIONER: Let's you might want
21	to take a short break then and figure that out.
22	Thank you. Let me know when you're ready to
23	go.
24	THE REGISTRAR: Order; all rise. À l'ordre;

1	The Hearing will resume in five minutes.
2	Upon recessing at 10:18 a.m. /

13	Commissioner. You'll see in the top left-hand corner under
14	the facsimile date of March 7^{th} , 2007 at 15:34
15	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
16	MR. KOZLOFF: what happened is that when
17	I received the document or was reviewing the document, it
18	occurred to me that this page had been inappropriately
19	redacted because it cut off in the middle of a note of a
20	conversation.
21	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
22	MR. KOZLOFF: So I went back into the I
23	went back to our people and received the original,
24	unredacted page and attempted to bring that to the
25	attention of people here, but again I can certainly

1	appreciate, Mr. Engelmann has said that with the number of
2	documents involved in this case, that one could have fallen
3	through the cracks.
4	In any event, I will refer to it as Bates
5	page 7156523 because it seems to me that
6	THE COMMISSIONER: Excuse me.
7	MR. KOZLOFF: Bless you.
8	THE COMMISSIONER: Thank you.
9	MR. KOZLOFF: It seems to me that that is
10	the appropriate way to refer to it.
11	And so, the conversation or the note that
12	Officer Wilson made of his conversation with Mr. Silmser,
13	he says,
14	"I want to let it drop, I'm very
15	upset with the way the whole thing
16	was handled. I asked for Silmser to
17	put this in writing, he replied: 'I'm
18	not going to put nothing in writing
19	for nobody. You guys had your chance
20	when I called in the first time and
21	you passed it off. I'm upset with
22	you, the Cornwall Police and the
23	Crown Attorney with the way the
24	whole thing was handled.' Refused to
25	meet with me again, said he wanted

1	the whole thing dropped. Told him to
2	think it over and call me back if he
3	wanted to talk. 9:10, conversation
4	concluded."
5	So, this is a note made by Detective
6	Constable Wilson of the OPP on the on the 7^{th} of December
7	1993, which is approximately a week, or eight days, before
8	the conversation that Mr. Silmser told you he had with the
9	representative from the Ministry of Corrections, and Mr.
10	Engelmann suggested that that was Mr. Roy.
11	What I would have suggested to Mr. Silmser
12	is first of all, that's another piece of evidence which
13	points to my suggestion that I made on the last day, about
14	the timing of the reporting. You recall, I suggested that
15	Mr. Silmser had called the OPP in and around December of
16	1992. Mr. Silmser's evidence was that his statement to that
17	effect, in his November 26 th 1993 statement to Detective
18	Constable Miller which leads off with:
19	"In December 1992 I tele I called
20	the OPP"
21	was incorrect. In fact, I suggest that it
22	was probably correct; that he did call the OPP some months
23	after the arrest in April of 1992, when he was it was
24	suggested to him that he should call back when he was in
25	sober condition.

1	THE COMMISSIONER: M'nm.
2	MR. KOZLOFF: And I'm going to suggest I
3	would have suggested to Mr. Silmser that, in fact,
4	Detective Constable Wilson here is attempting to pursue the
5	investigation of father MacDonald and Ken Seguin, and that
6	Silmser had no interest in pursuing the investigation of
7	Father MacDonald, given the \$32,000 settlement that he
8	would be putting at risk. I would also suggest it to Mr.
9	Silmser that this was his opportunity to cause an
10	investigation of Ken Seguin, a police investigation of Ken
11	Seguin to be made, if in fact he had any interest in doing
12	so.
13	And finally, this was also an opportunity
14	for Mr. Silmser to cause an investigation of Marcel Lalonde
15	to be made, and the reason I raise that is in relation to
16	his response to you, that he didn't think the police were
17	interested about it when they questioned him on the $26^{\rm th}$ of
18	November. This is 11 days later.
19	And that concludes my submission sir, with
20	respect to Officer Wilson's notes.
21	The next area sir is the videotaped
22	interview of David Silmser by Detective Inspector Smith and
23	Detective Constable Fagan.
24	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
25	MR. KOZLOFF: At the Kanata detachment of

1	the OPP on the 22^{nd} of February, 1994. The evidence in
2	relation to that begins on January the 30^{th} , at page 10 .
3	Mr. Commissioner, I hope you will appreciate
4	that I'm attempting to address the evidence in a
5	chronological sense
6	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
7	MR. KOZLOFF: so in some cases, he was
8	asked about things that took place at a later time, prior
9	to being asked about things that took place to a former
10	time.
11	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
12	MR. KOZLOFF: But this is the next
13	chronological event. At page 10, Mr. Engelmann asks,
14	"Do you have any recollection, or any
15	sense, as to how you felt at the end of that meeting?"
16	This is in relation to his meeting with the
17	Cornwall Police service officers. That first meeting,
18	referring to the meeting of the $28^{\rm th}$ of January 1993 and his
19	response is:
20	"Frustrated. I've always felt
21	frustrated at the end of meetings
22	because nothing was really advancing.
23	Nothing was, they didn't say they
24	were going to investigate this and do
25	this and do that. I had never had

1	any information at the end of the
2	meeting what was going to go on, so I
3	was frustrated."
4	THE COMMISSIONER: Clerk, do you have that
5	on a screen, someplace?
6	It my screen's not on.
7	MR. KOZLOFF: It would it would
8	THE COMMISSIONER: No, it's okay. It just
9	malfunctioned, here. Okay, here we go.
10	MR. KOZLOFF: That's between lines 11 and
11	19. Okay.
12	So I would ask Mr. Silmser I would have
13	asked Mr. Silmser, if, by the use of the words "always" and
14	"never" in his response, he's referring to just the meeting
15	he had on the 28^{th} of January 1993 with the Cornwall Police
16	Service officers, or whether he was referring to all
17	meetings with all police officers. Which, on a reading of
18	the answer, he may well be referring to all. Because he
19	says:
20	"I've always felt frustrated at the
21	end of meetings I never had any
22	information."
23	Mr. Silmser I would then ask you to refer
24	to pages 48 to 50 of the February 22^{nd} , 1994 interview.

36

THE COMMISSIONER: At page 40, you say?

1	that. When we make decisions, one
2	way or another, whether charges will
3	be laid or not but it will be in
4	consultation with the Crown Attorney,
5	and I don't mind updating you on it."
6	He's also telling you he also tells him
7	earlier,
8	"I can't tell you how long this
9	investigation is going to take,
10	because I don't know how many are out
11	there, how many former altar boys,
12	or who's going to come forward. I
13	can't tell you that. It'll be
14	thorough I can tell you that it'll
15	be thoroughly investigated by Mike
16	and myself, and other manpower is
17	required. I don't like to have to be
18	given deadlines, or anything."
19	So in my submission, Detective Inspector
20	Smith is taking the time to explain to Mr. Silmser how he
21	intends to approach the investigation.
22	At page 106 of the transcript of the 30^{th} of
23	January, Mr. Engelmann asks,
24	"Was this"
25	and he's referring to the videotaped

1	interview of Mr. Silmser, at the CAS on the 2^{nd} of November,
2	1993,
3	"a difficult interview."
4	You see that? It's
5	THE COMMISSIONER: What line is it?
6	MR. KOZLOFF: Line 8. page 106
7	THE COMMISSIONER: Yeah.
8	MR. KOZLOFF: January 30 th , Line 8.
9	THE COMMISSIONER: And what are you
10	referring to, there?
11	MR. KOZLOFF: He's referring to the CAS
12	interview of the 2^{nd} of November.
13	THE COMMISSIONER: All right.
14	MR. KOZLOFF: (Reads)
15	"Was this a difficult interview?"
16	The response is,
17	"They all were, that wasn't the only
18	interview. The Tim Smith and Mike
19	Fagan interview was a tough, tough
20	interview too. They never got
21	easier.
22	And then, at page 153 to 155, Mr. Engelmann
23	asks Mr. Silmser how the OPP came to interview him, in
24	February of 1994.
25	Just before I get to that, sir, I can tell

1	you that, with regard to this answer, this, "The Smith and
2	Fagan interview was a tough, tough interview, they never
3	got easier," I'll have some further comments to make when I
4	deal with what his evidence is, at pages 158-59. but,
5	suffice it to say that it'll be my position and I've
6	indicated this to you and to my friend that the only
7	fair way to respond to that evidence, and to the evidence
8	at pages 158-59 is to play the tape.
9	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
10	MR. KOZLOFF: At pages 153, 155 to 155, Mr.
11	Engelmann asks Mr. Silmser how the OPP came to interview
12	him in February of 1994. Mr. Silmser says he's not exactly
13	sure how that came about.
14	If I can refer you, then, to document
15	701568, these are the notes of Detective Inspector Smith
16	beginning at Bates page 7004008.
17	THE COMMISSIONER: Thank you.
18	Exhibit 392.
19	EXHIBIT NO./PIÈCE NO P-392:
20	(701568) Handwritten Notes - Detective
21	Inspector Tim Smith - February 3, 1994
22	MR. KOZLOFF: Thank you.
23	At page 7004008 the time is 10:30. The
24	entry at 10:30 for sorry, I'm not sure you have the
25	right okay. It says,

1	"Call David Silmser, number not in
2	service.
3	11:05, call Mrs. Silmser. No
4	answer.
5	11:14, paged David Silmser twice,
6	left message to call. 11:25, Bryce
7	Geoffrey. Advised him I had been
8	assigned to investigate allegations
9	of Silmser. Geoffrey advised he
10	represents Silmser and will cooperate
11	fully in the investigation. He is
12	happy OPP are investigating this
13	matter. Advised I would like to
14	interview subject and Geoffrey stated
15	he would like to be present. Advised
16	this is fine, and rather than write
17	everything down, we would like to
18	videotape interview.
19	In my submission sir, it would be open to me
20	to suggest for the purpose of clarification, that Detective
21	Inspector Smith made efforts to contact Mr. Silmser first
22	and that, when he was unable to do so, he contacted Bryce
23	Geoffrey and that it would have been clear to Mr. Geoffrey
24	and presumably to Mr. Silmser when Mr. Geoffrey spoke with
25	him, that the Ontario Provincial Police was intending to

1	conduct a thorough videotaped interview of Mr. Silmser
2	regarding his allegations.
3	The next reference, same document, 701568,
4	bates page 7004009. This is the next page, same date
5	February 8, 1994. We'll just wait for it to come up.
6	And the note is,
7	"Advise Geoffrey interview would take
8	place at Bells Corner OPP next week.
9	Would call later to firm date and
10	time."
11	And the entry at 12:05;
12	"Call Geoffrey, confirm date of
13	February 17, 1994, 13h00 Kanata OPP."
14	Just to explain that little discrepancy
15	between Bells Corner and Kanata. Prior to the building of
16	the OPP Kanata detachment, the OPP detachment in the
17	western part of Ottawa was Bells Corners.
18	So I think what's happened there is
19	Detective Inspector Smith has dated himself by referring to
20	the previous detachment when in fact the intention was to
21	meet in Kanata.
22	The next reference is on the same page
23	regarding February 10 th at 15:45.
24	"At 15:45 Geoffrey called, unable to
25	make interview. New appointment 13h00

1	22 February 1994, Kanata OPP; he would
2	advise Silmser."
3	And the next reference is document 701568 at
4	bates page 7004010, these are the notes of Detective
5	Inspector Smith again,
6	"February 22 nd , 1994, 12:55 to 14:55
7	interview David Silmser, lawyer Bryce
8	Geoffrey, Mike Fagan and self.
9	Videotaped interview; one break
10	between."
11	THE COMMISSIONER: I guess we'll find out if
12	and when we see the I guess I should reread the was
13	he ever warned or given a caution about the possible
14	extortion charges? I see the note there that the officer
15	called Peter Griffiths and discussed whether or not he
16	would be cautioned in that. What ever happened on that
17	part?
18	MR. KOZLOFF: He wasn't cautioned and wasn't
19	questioned.
20	THE COMMISSIONER: Okay.
21	MR. KOZLOFF: Detective Inspector Smith will
22	be far more capable of responding to your question when and
23	if he testifies here, sir.
24	THE COMMISSIONER: All right.
25	MR. KOZLOFF: So what I would suggest to Mr.

1	Silmser from that, is first of all if the officers
2	accommodated Mr. Silmser and his lawyer regarding
3	scheduling and location of meeting because Detective
4	Inspector Smith was coming from Kingston to conduct this
5	interview of Mr. Silmser. Mr. Geoffrey's practice was in
6	Ottawa, Mr. Silmser was residing in the Ottawa area, so
7	both the timing and the location of the interview were to
8	convenience Mr. Silmser and his lawyer.
9	It's a point.
10	THE COMMISSIONER: Well, to accommodate
11	them, they're the ones who want the statement, I mean
12	and they usually go to where the victim is.
13	MR. KOZLOFF: Perhaps I'm stating the
14	obvious sir, but both the timing and the location were to
15	convenience Mr. Silmser and his lawyer.
16	Secondly, Mr. Geoffrey was the logical
17	person to be the conduit between the OPP and Mr. Silmser
18	because Mr. Silmser was difficult to reach. Mr. Geoffrey
19	was easier to reach because he worked in a law office and
20	also, he wanted to be present and his scheduled had to be
21	accommodated.
22	Page 158 of the transcript, Mr. Engelmann
23	asks the following question, page 158 of the January $30^{\rm th}$
24	transcript,
25	Question and this at line five.

1	"You also mention, do you not, sir,
2	some allegations concerning Marcel
3	Lalonde on page 37?"
4	The response is "Okay" which I take it is
5	Mr. Silmser's way of agreeing with the suggestion.
6	I would ask you to read, first of all, pages
7	37 and 38 of Exhibit 267. At the very top, this is
8	immediately after questions concerning an affiliation
9	between Father MacDonald and Seguin. Mr. Silmser at the
10	bottom of page 36 says, "they were best friends."
11	Smith:
12	"Did you ever see them together?"
13	Silmser:
14	"Yeah, a few times."
15	Smith:
16	"M'hm."
17	Silmser:
18	"I can't remember."
19	And then Smith asks:
20	"M'hm, and there was some other
21	indication about a school teacher."
22	So, that is the first time that the Marcel
23	Lalonde issue is raised by any police officer with Mr.
24	Silmser that I am aware of, and the questions are:
25	"There was some other indication about

1	a school teacher."
2	"Yeah."
3	"Can you tell me anything about this
4	school teacher?"
5	"Well I remember going over to his
6	place and he tried to take advantage of
7	me too and he grabbed me. His name,
8	Marcel Lalonde."
9	"Where does he teach?"
10	"Bishop Macdonell, grade 8."
11	So, just to clarify the response, Mr.
12	Engelmann's question is "You also mention allegations
13	concerning Marcel Lalonde." Silmser does not bring up the
14	allegation against Lalonde. Silmser is specifically asked
15	about the allegation by Smith who raises it.
16	I'm going to suggest to you and this is
17	perhaps I would have suggested to Mr. Silmser that he
18	was really reluctant to provide details of the alleged
19	abuse and was asked to be more explicit regarding what
20	Lalonde did and said. And that will become more apparent,
21	sir, on a reading of the transcript.
22	Then at pages 158 and 159 which I referred
23	to earlier, Mr. Engelmann is questioning Mr. Silmser about
24	the interview. At line 13 he asks:
25	"Would it be fair to say that this is the broadest

1	interview you have had to date on some of these
2	allegations?"
3	Answer:
4	"It is, yes. It is the biggest one
5	anyways, yes."
6	Question:
7	"And you told us how difficult it was."
8	Answer:
9	"This one?"
10	Question:
11	"Well you told us that it was difficult
12	every time."
13	"Yes."
14	Question:
15	"This one?"
16	Answer:
17	"This one was ten times harder. I
18	think I wasn't actually in a good state
19	of mind when they brought me down here;
20	I was frustrated, I was depressed, I
21	was a big depression and Tim Smith just
22	pushed, pushed, pushed. He
23	wouldn't let me have a second break.
24	His questions were going bang, bang,
25	bang, bang, and I had been questioned

play the tape we're going to have to go in camera.

1	THE CHAIRMAN: We're going to have to go
2	into camera. Well, there's a test to apply.
3	MR. KOZLOFF: Yes.
4	THE COMMISSIONER: So, I understand that
5	there are also details of the abuse
6	MR. KOZLOFF: Yes.
7	THE COMMISSIONER: which is some
8	sensitivity I suppose.
9	MR. KOZLOFF: Yes.

2	MR. ENGELMANN: I do. There were several
3	concerns about the playing of this videotape publicly.
4	There would have been concerns about playing the videotape
5	if Mr. Silmser had been in the witness box, that he had
6	expressed and his counsel had expressed about potentially
7	re-victimizing him, et cetera.
8	In any event, Mr. Kozloff and I had an
9	exchange of correspondence and we determined that if
10	that an approach should be made with respect to
11	confidentiality measures for at least you to consider that.
12	If this tape was to be played, we don't have
13	Mr. Silmser here, so the concern about re-victimizing him
14	on the witness stand isn't present. However, if it were to
15	be played publicly, he's indicated to us through
16	correspondence that we've now all read, and through his

19	publicly would be humiliating to him and to his family.

MR. ENGELMANN: There are individuals mentioned on the tape that are subject to publication bans already. So therefore, the playing of the tape over the web cast could well be in violation of those publication bans.

9	shown on our web cast. There was no objection to that at
10	that time. Obviously, playing the tape publicly over the
11	web cast would not be respecting that measure that had been

13	Mr. Kozloff and I had this exchange in
14	writing, all counsel were copied. There was a discussion
15	about requesting confidentiality measures. It's my
16	understanding that no counsel but I'll certainly let people
17	in the room stand up if they want to, but that no counsel

were seeking that this tape be played publicly.

Those are some of the concerns that have

We were in a situation where we as the Commission were going to be playing the tape later on as part of the institutional response so I'm not objecting to the tape being entered. I think the tape is relevant; it certainly addresses concerns that Mr. Silmser raised, that we would have called as part of the institutional response with an OPP witness.

1	So, whether it's then or now, as long as
2	there are some confidentiality measures in place,
3	Commission counsel certainly has no objection.
4	THE COMMISSIONER: How long is the tape?
5	MR. ENGELMANN: My understanding is it's
6	approximately two hours long.
7	The quality of the tape is not the best.
8	It's grainy, it's
9	THE COMMISSIONER: Yes.
10	MR. ENGELMANN: a bit difficult to see
11	people. But it is it is the full tape
12	THE COMMISSIONER: Yes.
13	MR. ENGELMANN: and I think with perhaps
14	one break at some point in the tape, and it's clear where
15	that is.
16	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
17	MR. ENGELMANN: The tape does reflect the
18	transcript, which is already in evidence
19	THE COMMISSIONER: Yes.
20	MR. ENGELMANN: at Exhibit 267. So,
21	those are my brief submissions. I wanted to add that
22	notice was given to the press that Mr. Kozloff would be
23	seeking to introduce the tape, with some form of
24	confidentiality measure.

THE COMMISSIONER: Yes.

1	MR. ENGELMANN: I indicated to the Standard
2	Freeholder, to the local radio station, and to the CBC
3	through its counsel that such a request would be made this
4	week by Mr. Kozloff. And as far as I knew, no counsel were

16	offend the publication ban. The publication ban is there.
17	People who are present know that they can't publish names
18	they hear. That would be my initial thought, but there may
19	be people counsel who want to comment, and again, those
20	present may well have all signed undertakings so
21	THE COMMISSIONER: I don't know.

25	(cont'd/Suite):

1	MR. KOZLOFF: We could use the money
2	Let the record show please, it was Mr.
3	Sherriff-Scott who jumped on we called that piling on,
4	when I played football.
5	I have no response to the question because I
6	would never give you anything but an accurate answer, and I
7	don't have the information.
8	Mr. Commissioner, I just wanted to
9	THE COMMISSIONER: I should point out,
10	before we go on for the people that are joining us now -
11	- I feel like an MC someplace, sometimes.
12	We have finished reviewing the video of a
13	statement given by Mr. Silmser in the presence of two
14	investigators, and Mr. Silmser's lawyer at the time, Mr.
15	Geoffrey, I think.
16	MR. KOZLOFF: Just to reiterate what Mr.
17	Silmser said to you, sir, under oath at pages 158 and 159.
18	He said:
19	"I was in a big depression and Tim
20	Smith just pushed, pushed,
21	pushed. He wouldn't let me
22	have a second break. His questions
23	were going bang, bang, and I
24	had been questioned so much through
25	that period of time that my patience

1	ran low."
2	And then Mr. Engelmann asks him again:
3	"It was mainly Detective Inspector
4	Smith who was asking the questions?"
5	Answer:
6	"That's right".
7	Question:
8	"So just coming at you too fast there."
9	Answer:
10	"Way too fast."
11	The reason, sir, as I have indicated
12	that I wanted you to hear the tape was because it addresses
13	not just the content, which the transcript addresses
14	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
15	MR. KOZLOFF: but also the tone and the
16	pace of the interview.
17	I would take this position with Mr. Silmser,
18	that Detective Inspector Smith explained to him patiently
19	and sympathetically why he had to be thorough in the way in
20	which he conducted the investigation.
21	I would suggest to Mr. Silmser that neither
22	Detective Inspector Smith nor Detective Constable Fagan put
23	any undue pressure on him, that it wasn't a matter of
24	Detective Inspector Smith not wanting to give Mr. Silmser a
25	break in other words, a respite during the course of the

1	interview but rather, Mr. Silmser saying all of a sudden
2	that he wanted to that had to leave early in order to go
3	pick up his wife, or meet his wife which led to Mr.
4	Silmser's being upset that it was his own lawyer, Mr.
5	Geoffrey, that tried to find some way to keep Mr. Silmser
6	there to let the officers do their job. That seemed to
7	upset Mr. Silmser so much that he lost it and walked out of
8	the room and that his own lawyer, in fact, had to go out
9	after Mr. Silmser and convince him to come back.
10	Those are the things that I would have
11	suggested, Mr. Commissioner.
12	THE COMMISSIONER: That's one
13	interpretation, yes.
14	MR. KOZLOFF: Yes.
15	I want to deal now with the next area, which
16	is the relationship between David Silmser and Detective
17	Inspector Smith.
18	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
19	
19	MR. KOZLOFF: First of all, I pointed out to
20	MR. KOZLOFF: First of all, I pointed out to you the comment in Detective Inspector Smith in the
20	you the comment in Detective Inspector Smith in the
20 21	you the comment in Detective Inspector Smith in the transcript at page 47 of Exhibit 267 we've already
20 21 22	you the comment in Detective Inspector Smith in the transcript at page 47 of Exhibit 267 we've already touched on this. I don't think you need to bring it back.

1	these [referring to altar boys]
2	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
3	MR. KOZLOFF: "but if you recall the
4	names of some of the altar boys."
5	And it's our position sir, that what
6	Detective Inspector Smith is saying to Mr. Silmser at that
7	point, amongst other things, is that he is sharing with him
8	his intention that, during the course of their
9	investigation, they are going to interview other altar
10	boys. And he is asking Mr. Silmser not to compromise the
11	investigation by discussing his evidence with other,
12	prospective witnesses.
13	Now, in terms of the relationship, sir, I'd
14	ask you to bring up Detective Inspector Smith's notes.
15	It's Document 701568 at Bates Pages 7004010 and 7004011.
16	These are his notes
17	THE COMMISSIONER: This is Exhibit 391,
18	Madam Clerk.
19	MR. KOZLOFF: Yes, thank you.
20	THE COMMISSIONER: Okay.
21	MR. KOZLOFF: Sir, these are the notes that
22	he made on the $1^{\rm st}$ of March 1994. If you could just scroll
23	down to March 1? Thank you.
24	And bear in mind sir, this is six days,
25	seven days, depending on whether that was a leap year, from

1	the 22 nd of February	<i>7</i> :
2		"9:20: Received message from Officer
3		to call David Silmser and if I
4		didn't he was going to the press.
5		Called David Silmser. He asked how
6		investigation was progressing. I
7		advised two officers were working on
8		same, and were in the process of
9		interviewing past altar boys. He
10		said he didn't care about them, he
11		wanted charges laid soon for what
12		happened to him. He advised he had
13		another come forward who had same
14		thing happen to him by Seguin and
15		MacDonald. I asked if he would speak
16		to us, or would David give us his
17		name? He said no. Further stated,
18		'You'd better lay charges soon, or
19		we're going to the press. I am
20		pissed off.' I tried to explain this
21		investigation required some
22		cooperation on his part. He said he
23		was 'pissed off' and hung up on me at
24		9:23. 9:24: Attempted to call
25		Silmser's lawyer, Bryce Geoffrey."

1	Now, I would put to Mr. Silmser, sir, that
2	Detective Inspector Smith had explained to him at the
3	conclusion of the February 22^{nd} 1994 interview that he did
4	not know how long the investigation would take, because he
5	did not know how many former altar boys, or who, would come
6	forward. That Mr. Silmser, I would suggest to him, was
7	completely in unreasonable and inappropriate on the $1^{\rm st}$ of
8	March in threatening to go to the press, in saying he
9	didn't care about other altar boys and demanding charges be
10	laid soon for what happened to him and in purporting to
11	hold back information from the police about other people
12	coming forward, particularly after the explanation
13	Detective Inspector Smith had given him during the
14	interview, about how being provided with that information
15	would really help the police a lot.
16	It was this telephone call that Silmser made
17	on March the $1^{\rm st}$ 1994, barely a week after the first meeting
18	with Smith and Fagan on February 22^{nd} , not the manner in
19	which the February 22^{nd} 1994 interview was conducted I would
20	suggest to Mr. Silmser, which had the profound effect on
21	his future relationship with Detective Inspector Smith. In
22	my submission to Mr
23	THE COMMISSIONER: Submissions.
24	MR. KOZLOFF: In my it would be my
25	position which I would state to Mr. Silmser that it left

1	Detective Inspector Smith in a position where he had no
2	alternative but to contact Mr. Geoffrey and go through him
3	from that point on, rather than confront Silmser.
4	The next area, sir, that I
5	THE COMMISSIONER: Just a minute could
6	you just scroll that down, Madam Clerk, a little bit?
7	Okay.
8	MR. KOZLOFF: And you can see, sir, you've
9	scrolled down in fact to March 2^{nd} 1994. At 9:10 we have a
10	telephone call
11	THE COMMISSIONER: Madam Clerk?
12	MR. KOZLOFF: a conversation between
13	Detective sorry, could you just leave it where it was?
14	THE COMMISSIONER: Sorry.
15	MR. KOZLOFF: Sorry, that's where I was.
16	You have a telephone March 2 nd , 9:10.
17	THE COMMISSIONER: Okay.
18	MR. KOZLOFF: "Telephone call to Bryce
19	Geoffrey re David Silmser. Called
20	yesterday. Discuss events of
21	yesterday. Mr. Geoffrey apologized for
22	Silmser's actions; stated he spoke to
23	him telling him to allow us to get on
24	with the investigation. Also told him
25	to get name of witness who was abused

1	by MacDonald and give to him. Geoffrey
2	will approach this person to have him
3	report this to us. I advised Geoffrey,
4	should I require
5	anything from Silmser I would go
6	through him rather than confront
7	Silmser. He agreed."
8	THE COMMISSIONER: I guess the video should
9	be entered as an exhibit.
10	MR. KOZLOFF: Yes, thank you, sir.
11	REGISTRAR: Three ninety-three (393).
12	THE COMMISSIONER: Three nine three. Thank
13	you.
14	MR. KOZLOFF: The next area, sir, that I'm
15	going to cover is the 1994 investigation.
16	Sorry?
17	MR. ENGELMANN: I perhaps I'm mistaken,
18	but I thought we when we entered the transcript
19	THE COMMISSIONER: Sure.
20	MR. ENGELMANN: that we entered the
21	transcript and the video at the same time and said if there
22	was a discrepancy, the video would override?
23	THE COMMISSIONER: That is true.
24	MR. ENGELMANN: So I think it's already an
25	exhibit?

1	THE COMMISSIONER: So we don't need that.
2	Thank you.
3	MR. ENGELMANN: Maybe I can just give you a
4	number, I think I have it
5	UNIDENTIFIED: Two sixty seven (267).
6	THE COMMISSIONER: Yeah, 267 should be the
7	same exhibit. Thank you.
8	MR. KOZLOFF: All right. Thank you.
9	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
10	MR. KOZLOFF: At page 161 of the transcript
11	of January the $30^{\rm th}$, during the course of Mr. Engelmann's
12	examination, Mr. Engelmann puts to him just prior to this
13	comment that I'm going to point out for you he puts to
14	Mr. Silmser. He's talking about the altar boys and then he
15	quotes:
16	"But if you recall the names of some
17	of the altar boys that were there at
18	the same time and had access to
19	Father MacDonald we would appreciate
20	that because we would what we will
21	do is we'll individually interview
22	each of them and sometimes when they
23	find out that there are others there
24	then they will come and they will
25	tell us things [etc]."

1	Do you see that? Mr. Silmser says "yes" and
2	then asks Mr. Engelmann the question, "Did they interview
3	them?"
4	In my submission, sir, to Mr. Silmser, that
5	response of Mr. Silmser to Mr. Engelmann was disingenuous.
6	And it's disingenuous, given his conversation with
7	Detective Inspector Smith on March 1st 1994 which I have
8	just referred to, in which Detective Inspector Smith is
9	telling him that they are interviewing altar boys. And
10	also the evidence of Mr. Silmser himself at page 127 of the
11	January 30 th 2007 transcript, where he said:
12	"But I also know that Chris McDonell
13	was going around to the altar boys
14	and bad mouthing me when he was doing
15	the investigation."
16	In fact, Mr. Silmser himself knows for a
17	fact that the OPP was interviewing altar boys.
18	And at page 165 of the $30^{\rm th}$ of January 2007
19	transcript, these questions and answers appear:
20	Question: "Now did they get back to
21	you that calendar year, 1994, and
22	advise you about other victims or
23	alleged victims that they had found?"
24	Answer: "Never to me. I don't know
25	if they ever got back to my lawyer.

1	Question: "All right. Did they
2	re-interview you to your knowledge at
3	any time later than 1994?"
4	Answer: "No."
5	Question: "Did they ever go back
6	and go into more detail on some of
7	this lengthy interview that you had
8	with him that day?"
9	Answer: "No, I don't believe so."
10	Well I will now, sir, take you through a
11	number of entries in Detective Inspector Smith's notebook
12	which will provide some colouration to those answers.
13	Beginning with there's first of all that
14	March 2^{nd} telephone call between Geoffrey and Smith in which
15	Smith asks Geoffrey to get the name of the witness who was
16	abused by MacDonald and give it to him, and Geoffrey is to
17	approach that person and have them report it to the police.
18	Then on the 8^{th} of March, this is Bates page
19	7004012, the entry is at 11:
20	"Meeting with Constables Fagan,
21	McDonell, Genier, 14 local persons to
22	interview. Nine have been interviewed.
23	Of all interviews, only allegation
24	Silmser, moniker 3, won't speak to us.
25	One person possible rubbed crotch area

1	when Father MacDonald changing gears."
2	Then the following reference at Bates page
3	7004015. This is the 9^{th} of March '94 1500 hrs to 1510 hrs.
4	It's a telephone call to Bryce Geoffrey:
5	"Asked for release of Silmser's school
6	records. He will provide same. Asked
7	to get name of additional alleged
8	victim. Geoffrey advised Silmser had
9	first name and should have full
10	particulars later next week.
11	Allegation is against Father MacDonald
12	and it is sexual."
13	I would have suggested, sir, to Mr. Silmser
14	that there were no other victims or alleged victims coming
15	forward to the police in 1994; that the efforts by
16	Detective Inspector Smith to deal with Silmser on a
17	rational and reasonable basis met with a hostile and un-
18	cooperative attitude; and that Smith then contacted
19	Geoffrey at the earliest opportunity to deal with Silmser's
20	unwillingness to cooperate in order to follow up on the
21	lead that Silmser was purportedly holding out on.
22	The next reference would be in the same
23	Exhibit at Bates page 7004017, 16^{th} of June 1994, $12:25$ to
24	12:35. Sixteenth of June '94? Right.
25	"Also call from Silmser re he has three

1	more victims threatening me of my job
2	if we don't get to him. Investigation
3	is still going. More interviews.
4	Don't know when we will be finished.
5	Info to come from his lawyer. Possible
6	three more Silmser as of 14 June '94.
7	School records, more work to be done."
8	So I would suggest to Mr. Silmser that he
9	was continuing to play games while failing
10	THE COMMISSIONER: Well
11	MR. KOZLOFF: Well?
12	THE COMMISSIONER: Sir, you know there's two
13	things.
14	MR. KOZLOFF: Yes.
15	THE COMMISSIONER: First of all, I guess is
16	"Know Thy Judge." You are not scoring any big points with
17	me by doing this.
18	MR. KOZLOFF: Okay. Let me address this,
19	sir, and I say this with great respect.
20	THE COMMISSIONER: Yes. M'hm.
21	MR. KOZLOFF: We go back to the point in
22	time when Mr. Silmser places us in this rather invidious
23	position by leaving.
24	THE COMMISSIONER: Yes.
25	MR. KOZLOFF: We try to address that by

71

1 sitting down with counsel who represent the parties who 2 have yet to cross-examine, and Commission counsel to try to 3 come up with a workable means of somehow compensating for the loss of the opportunity to cross-examine. And that, in 4 5 my submission, entails, from my point of view -- and this is what I proposed that I would do back at the time that we 6 7 discussed this in here -- I said I would look for 8 documentation, for statements, for prior evidence under 9 oath, for evidence under oath in this courtroom, for 10 notebooks, entries in notebooks in order to come up with 11 evidence, which either contradicted Mr. Silmser or 12 clarified or added some coloration to what he had said. 13 That was the proposal. 14 THE COMMISSIONER: And I have no problems with that at all. What my problem is, is with the use of 15 your adjectives and the conclusions that you're putting 16 17 there. 18 Sir, sir, let me finish. 19 MR. KOZLOFF: Yes. 20 THE COMMISSIONER: You know when you read 21 through that, you know, that Silmser phoned me, and he 22 said, "I'm going to go to the press" and things like that. 23 I can draw my own conclusions out of that. And I'm asking you once again to refrain from using those adjectives until 24 25 you get to the submission stage. That's all I'm asking

1	you.
2	You can read out those things. When you
3	look at it on the face, you can see very clearly when he
4	says, "They never did anything". You've got, when they're
5	in police officers' notes about what he said. I don't want
6	to run your case, but I'm telling you that the silence in
7	those words speaks volumes.
8	MR. KOZLOFF: Correct.
9	THE COMMISSIONER: So you don't have to do
10	that. And then you keep the judge happy.
11	MR. KOZLOFF: The next entry then is the $25^{\rm th}$
12	of July 1994, Bates page 7004020, 1340 hrs.
13	"Call from Bryce Geoffrey; update on
14	investigation. Request he confronts
15	Silmser and ask if he would be more
16	compliant."
17	I guess Detective Inspector Smith is making
18	my submissions for me there.

4	Mr. Geoffrey was suggesting that there was an offence of

8	Detective Inspector Smith is being candid with Mr. Geoffrey
9	regarding the difficulties with the investigation.
10	"On the 19^{th} of September '94, he
11	advises Geoffrey again in his

10	thanked us for the investigation and
11	apologized for his behaviour and stated
12	he had been under extreme pressure and
13	distress."
14	Same date.
15	THE COMMISSIONER: Can you scroll down a
16	little bit more, Madam Clerk?
17	MR. KOZLOFF: Yes.
18	THE COMMISSIONER: I just want to have a
19	peak there. Okay.
20	MR. KOZLOFF: He goes on to say:
21	"Hope Father MacDonald never gets a
22	parish again."
23	If you flip over to the next page:
24	"I advised Silmser when I had written
25	recommendation of Crown, I would
